The word multiculturalism to me is a just a euphemism or a vehicle for integrating into Australian society. It is my belief that the words "integrate" and "assimilation" in this context means being part of the society; the former would indicate not losing one's identity while the latter indicates losing all of your past.

But then again these are my thoughts on the subject only. If that is the case do we believe that faith or a religion is sufficient to retain a culture or we fail to keep on the right track in keeping the traditions. Hopefully the next generation will continue Although I agree completely on the above subject, that we can learn from them in some ways. On the other hand if a person has a different religion, different colour, use another language other than Greek, he has Greek DNA, (one parent was a Greek), thinks like a Greek and believes he or she is a Greek, are they Greek?

I don't believe that whatever others say that we the Australian Greeks will be seen as racists. The Greeks in Greece are no better as I have seen them in action.
