For instance, Conroy in 2025 showed a slight improvement compared to Sharn Coombes' performance in 2022, yet fell short when compared to the 2024 by-election. Likewise, Manny Cicchiello's performance might be more favourable when evaluated against the by-election where Roshena ran, suggesting that he did not experience as significant a setback.

Ultimately, Cicchiello's campaign must balance traditional Liberal strengths with innovative approaches to address the evolving political landscape of Aston. The outcome will not only reflect his campaign's effectiveness but also the broader electoral dynamics at play in Victoria.

The 2025 federal election campaign for Ballarat, led by Liberal candidate Paula Doran, illustrates the ongoing challenges facing the Liberal Party in traditionally marginal seats that have become Labor strongholds. Despite achieving a 2.48% swing against Labor incumbent Catherine King, Doran's campaign highlighted both the strengths and limitations of the Liberal Party's approach to regional campaigning.

While Doran's messaging resonated with agricultural and regional development issues, the campaign faced difficulties in connecting with urban voters on issues such as healthcare, infrastructure, and economic opportunity. Looking forward, the analysis suggests several critical areas for future Liberal campaigns in Ballarat. Primary among these is the need to develop stronger urban engagement strategies while maintaining rural support. This requires enhanced digital capabilities, improved data analytics, and more robust year-round community presence.

The results indicate that future success will require significant strategic evolution, particularly in:

This balanced approach, combined with robust resource management and comprehensive community engagement, will be crucial for building broader support in this traditionally challenging electorate.

The 2025 federal election campaign for Goldstein, led by incumbent Liberal MP Tim Wilson, highlights the challenges faced by traditional Liberal campaigns in affluent, progressive-leaning electorates. The significant 6.5% swing against the Liberal Party and subsequent loss to an Independent candidate reveals fundamental shifts in voter alignment and issue priorities. Wilson's campaign demonstrated the difficulties of maintaining Liberal support in an electorate increasingly focused on climate action and integrity measures. The campaign's traditional economic and business focus, while historically effective, proved insufficient against emerging voter priorities.

The campaign's understanding of Goldstein's demographic evolution proved crucial but ultimately inadequate. The mix of affluent professionals, climate-conscious voters, and progressive youth required sophisticated engagement strategies that the campaign struggled to deliver effectively.

Resource management revealed both strengths and significant limitations. While the campaign maintained strong business community connections and traditional fundraising capabilities, it showed gaps in digital strategy and progressive voter outreach. Looking forward, the analysis suggests several critical areas for future Liberal campaigns in Goldstein:

This campaign provides important insights into political representation in agricultural electorates, underlining the need for balanced attention to traditional farming interests and emerging environmental concerns. The results suggest that successful campaigns in such electorates require a combination of strong agricultural credentials, practical policy solutions, and effective management of regional issues.

# APPENDIX 2 CRITICAL ANALYSIS

Introduction. The 2025 Federal Election in Victoria marked a watershed moment in Australian politics, reflecting significant shifts in voter sentiment and political dynamics. The election results were telling, with the Labor Party securing a decisive victory, driven by strategic messaging and alignment with mainstream values such as climate action, gender equity, and integrity. Conversely, the Coalition, under Peter Dutton's leadership, faced a significant defeat, grappling with policy misalignments and a failure to connect with key demographics.

Election Results Overview. Labor, led by Anthony Albanese, expanded its majority in the House of Representatives, defying expectations of a potential hung parliament. The party's success was largely attributed to its focus on issues resonating with a broad spectrum of voters, including climate change, social justice, and transparency in governance. In contrast, the Coalition's shift towards rightward policies and unpopular proposals, such as introducing nuclear energy, alienated moderate voters and failed to capture the enthusiasm of women, young people, and urban professionals.

#### KEY FACTORS INFLUENCING THE ELECTION OUTCOME

- Labor's Strategic Messaging. Labor effectively capitalized on mainstream values, appealing to a wide range
  of voters by addressing critical issues such as climate change, gender equity, and integrity. Their forwardthinking policies aligned with global trends, gaining traction in urban centres and among progressive
  constituencies.
- The Coalition's Missteps. The Coalition faced significant challenges, including a rightward shift that
  alienated moderate voters. Their proposal to introduce nuclear energy clashed with the growing environmental
  consciousness among Australians. Additionally, the Coalition struggled to appeal to women and younger
  voters, further contributing to their electoral losses.
- Impact of Third Parties. The Greens experienced setbacks, with their leader, Adam Bandt, at risk of losing
  his seat. This highlighted the party's struggle to expand its appeal beyond its core base, as Labor's
  comprehensive environmental and social policies outflanked their offerings.
- Voter Demographics and Trends. The election results underscored a realignment in voter demographics.
  There was a marked increase in support for Labor among women, young voters, and urban dwellers, reflecting
  a desire for progressive change. The Coalition's traditional base in suburban and rural areas was insufficient
  to counterbalance these shifts, leading to losses in key urban seats.
- Victoria's Role in the Election. Victoria played a crucial role in Labor's success. The rejection of Trumpstyle politics and the Coalition's nuclear energy plan resonated strongly with Victorian voters, who prioritized climate action and social equity. This regional sentiment was pivotal in swinging several marginal seats in favour of Labor.

## STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES OF THE VICTORIAN CAMPAIGN

- Grassroots Support: The Liberal Party retained strong support in traditional rural areas, leveraging established networks and local connections.

- Metropolitan Disconnect: The campaign's messaging failed to resonate with metropolitan voters, who prioritized issues like climate change and housing affordability.
- Internal Conflicts: Internal party conflicts and lack of cohesive strategy undermined public perception and campaign effectiveness.
- Labor's Counter-Messaging: Labor's campaign effectively countered the Liberal Party's messaging, particularly on economic and social issues.
- Addressing Victorian Concerns. The campaign's failure to adequately address key concerns such as
  housing affordability, infrastructure development, and healthcare accessibility highlighted a disconnect with
  voter priorities. These issues were critical in shaping voter decisions and ultimately influenced the election
  outcome.
- External Influences: The Trump Effect. Former US President Donald Trump's influence was evident in shaping voter perceptions, particularly affecting conservative politics and climate change debates. This created challenges for the Liberal Party, which struggled to balance traditional conservative values with the need for modern, progressive policies.

- Economic Pressures: Rising interest rates and inflation heightened concerns about economic security and cost of living.

- Climate Concerns: Environmental issues and renewable energy initiatives were pivotal in shaping voter preferences.

- Trust in Leadership: Confidence in political leadership and the ability to manage challenges effectively
  influenced voter decisions.

- Climate Action: Demands for renewable energy transition and environmental protection were prevalent.
- Healthcare: Accessibility and mental health services were key issues.

## LESSONS FOR FUTURE CAMPAIGNS

- Modernized Techniques: Embracing modern campaign methods and digital strategies is crucial for engaging younger voters.
- Local Engagement: Prioritizing local issues and community engagement can strengthen voter connections.
- Policy Communication: Clear and consistent policy messaging is essential for building voter trust and support.
- Volunteer Management: Enhancing volunteer recruitment and management can improve campaign effectiveness and reach.
- Crisis Management: Developing robust crisis response protocols can mitigate campaign disruptions and maintain public confidence.

The 2025 Victorian Federal Election highlighted significant challenges and opportunities for the Liberal Party. Addressing these issues through modernization, strategic planning, and enhanced communication can position the party for future success. Embracing change while maintaining core values will be crucial in rebuilding voter support and establishing a foundation for future electoral victories. The lessons learned from this campaign provide a roadmap for necessary reforms, underscoring the importance of adaptability and responsiveness in a rapidly evolving political landscape.

- 3. Local Talent Utilization: The text advises against importing North American campaign strategies, citing cultural differences. Instead, it encourages utilizing local talent and ideas, which are more attuned to the Australian cultural environment. This approach not only reduces wasteful spending but also aligns the campaign with local values and expectations.
- 4.
