GLOSSARY

This glossary serves as a comprehensive reference for terms associated with the HANZAC Memorial, its history, and significance. Terms may be updated or expanded as the memorial continues to evolve and new elements are added to its legacy.

A

- **ANZAC:** Australian and New Zealand Army Corps; military forces that served in World Wars I and II. The term has become a symbol of bravery and mateship, first coined in 1915 during the Gallipoli Campaign.
- **Abalinx:** Digital platform and publishing entity founded by Peter Adamis in 1999, dedicated to preserving cultural and military heritage, particularly focusing on Hellenic-ANZAC relations.

- **Campaign Medals:** Military decorations awarded to personnel who served in the Greek and Cretan campaigns.

- **Dedication Ceremony:** Official opening of the HANZAC Memorial in 2017, attended by dignitaries from three nations.
- **Delphi Bank:** Major supporter of the HANZAC Memorial project.

- **Eucalyptus Trees:** Australian native trees planted at the memorial, each named for fallen soldiers, symbolizing the Australian presence.
- **Evzones:** Greek Presidential Guard, participating in memorial ceremonies.

- **Greek-Australian Veterans:** Former service members who fought in both Greek and Australian forces.
- **Greek Orthodox Church:** Religious institution playing a significant role in memorial ceremonies.

- **HANZAC:** Hellenic Australian New Zealand Armed Corps; represents the unified military heritage of three nations.

APPENDIX 1: THE SACRED AND HALLOWED GROUND

The Sacred and Hallowed Ground of the HANZAC Memorial. Nestled within the verdant landscape of the HANZAC Memorial in Pellana, Laconia, Greece, lies a sacred and hallowed ground – a place where the stories of three nations converge, where the echoes of past battles reverberate, and where the enduring spirit of the ANZAC forces is honoured and revered. As visitors step onto this hallowed ground, they are immediately struck by the sense of reverence and solemnity that permeates the air. It is also the area where at every special event the memorial is blessed by the local priest and commemorated by the local villagers.

The four marble steles that stand before them, each one a testament to a different aspect of the ANZAC legacy, serve as a poignant reminder of the sacrifices made by the soldiers of Australia, New Zealand, and Greece during the battles of World War II. The funds for this hallowed ground were provided by Australian veterans and Australians of Hellenic heritage, whose names can be found in Appendix 11. But the hallowed ground of the HANZAC Memorial is not just a tribute to the soldiers who fought and died;

The first stele is a visual of three soldiers from three nations as comrades in arms, Hellenic, Australian and New Zealand, whose spirit demonstrates, a narrative that has become synonymous with the courage, camaraderie, and unwavering determination that defined the actions of these brave men on the battlefield. On the rear is a poem about mates and what does it mean to be a mate, a friend and ad digger.

The second stele, is story of the ANZACS at Gallipoli and what the words ANZAC mean are depicted on this marble slab, with images created by the skilled hand of artist Joe Zapp, serve as a visceral reminder of the horrors of war and the immense sacrifices made by those who stood in defence of their homelands. On the rear of the marble stele are the words etched into the marble, penned by the hand of Bill Charlton, a veteran who served alongside the ANZAC forces, speak to the unbreakable bonds that were forged in the crucible of war, inscriptions invoking a sense of reverence and eternal youth for the fallen.

The third stele, a poignant tribute to the Assyrian paratroopers who fell during the battles of Greece and Crete. These men, hailing from a distant land, had answered the call to defend the principles of freedom and democracy, and their sacrifice is honoured and remembered alongside those of their ANZAC and Hellenic comrades. The stele is also a testament to the innocent civilians who suffered and struggled during the darkest days of the conflict. The stele also chronicles the Battle of Greece and Crete by the Helenes, Australians and New Zealanders.

The fourth stele is the Honour board, etched into this wall are the names of countless individuals who have been a part of Peter Adamis' life, from family members and military comrades to community leaders and supporters. The image is of the olive tree which stands beside the sacred and hallowed ground representing all those families who lost a loved one during times of war. This stele also chronicles the harrowing battles that raged and advises visitors of who donated to the HANZAC Memorial



As visitors move through this sacred space, they are surrounded by the gentle flutter of three flags – the Hellenic, the Australian, and the New Zealand – each one a symbol of the unbreakable bond that has united these three nations in the face of adversity. And underfoot, the ground is carpeted with a sea of red poppies, their vibrant blooms a testament to the enduring legacy of the ANZAC forces, whose sacrifices are remembered and honoured each April on ANZAC Day. But the hallowed ground of the HANZAC Memorial is more than just a collection of monuments and memorials; it is a living, breathing embodiment of the shared struggle and triumph of the ANZAC, Hellenic, and Assyrian forces. The long stone wall that supports the ANZAC Gardens sign is a testament to the dedication and hard work of the local villagers who came together to bring this project to life.

These names, a testament to the power of community and the enduring bonds of friendship, serve as a reminder that the HANZAC Memorial is not just a tribute to the fallen, but a celebration of the living who have dedicated themselves to preserving their memory. And at the very heart of the hallowed ground, a circular mosaic pattern holds a round urn that contains the eternal flame, lit on special occasions to honour the memory of the fallen. The two arms that embrace this sacred space, like the loving embrace of a parent, serve as a physical manifestation of the enduring bonds that have united these three nations in the face of adversity.

The construction of this hallowed ground was no small feat, and it required the collaborative efforts of a dedicated team of volunteers and skilled craftsmen. Among them were Gerald Merici and Vittorio Merici, two young Albanian workers whose tireless efforts in digging, collecting, and transporting the necessary materials were essential to the project's success. Joining them were Panagiotis "Spitha" Rassias, Vasili Panagiotou, Kostas Sgourdas, Stefanos Sgourdas, Yiannis and Spiro Tsonis, and George Rassias, each one contributing their unique skills and expertise to the creation of this remarkable tribute. And, of course, the unwavering support and in-kind contributions of the villagers of Pellana were instrumental in ensuring that the hallowed ground of the HANZAC Memorial would stand as a lasting testament to the sacrifices of the past.

As the sun rises and sets over the towering Taygetos Mountain range, casting its warm glow upon the HANZAC Memorial, the hallowed ground at its heart becomes a place of reverence, reflection, and a shared commitment to ensuring that the sacrifices made by the ANZAC, Hellenic, and Assyrian forces will never be forgotten. For those who walk this sacred space, it is a transformative experience, a journey through time and space that connects them to the enduring legacy of those who fought and died in the name of freedom. And as they leave, they carry with them a renewed sense of appreciation for the power of unity, the courage of the human spirit, and the enduring bonds that have defined the relationship between these three nations for generations.



APPENDIX 2: AVENUE OF HONOUR

A Lasting Legacy at the HANZAC Memorial. Winding its way through the verdant landscape of the HANZAC Memorial in Pellana, Laconia, Greece, the Avenue of Honour stands as a testament to the enduring spirit of the Hellenic and ANZAC forces that fought and sacrificed together during the battles of World War II. This remarkable feature of the memorial is more than just a simple pathway; it is a living, breathing embodiment of the deep connections that bind these three nations together. At the heart of the Avenue of Honour are the fourteen pillars that line its sides, each one representing one of the northern villages of the Laconia region.

The pillars of the Avenue of Honour are more than just decorative elements; they are the driving force behind the HANZAC project. Each one represents a vibrant community, a place where the echoes of history still resonate, and where the bonds of kinship and shared sacrifice continue to shape the lives of the people. As visitors stroll down the Avenue of Honour, they are greeted by the sight of the tall bushes that flank the pathway, their gnarled trunks and verdant canopies a testament to the enduring resilience of the Hellenic people. These trees, were suggested by Dina Houdris, planted and named by the author, serve as a living link to the past, a reminder of the deep roots that have nourished the Hellenic spirit for millennia.

"The olive trees of the Avenue of Honour are more than just a decorative element," Adamis says. "They are a symbol of the unbreakable connection between the land and the people, a testament to the resilience and adaptability that have allowed the Hellenic nation to endure through the ages." Interspersed among the olive trees are towering bushes, their lush foliage providing a natural canopy that casts a gentle shade over the pathway. These bushes, carefully curated and maintained by the HANZAC team, serve as a living tribute to the sacrifices made by the ANZAC and Hellenic forces, their verdant growth a symbol of the enduring legacy that these soldiers have left behind.

"The sand of the Avenue of Honour is more than just a decorative element," Adamis explains. "It is a symbol of the enduring bond between the land and the people, a testament to the deep roots that have nourished the Hellenic and ANZAC spirits for generations." At the entrance to the Avenue of Honour, two majestic lions stand guard, their fierce gazes fixed upon the horizon. These towering statues, crafted from local stone and marble, serve as a powerful symbol of the strength and resilience that have defined the Hellenic people throughout their history. "The lions of the Avenue of Honour are a testament to the indomitable spirit of the Hellenic people," Adamis says. "They stand as sentinels, watching over the sacred ground of the HANZAC Memorial and reminding all who pass through of the courage and determination that have defined the Hellenic struggle for freedom."

The construction of the Avenue of Honour was no small feat, and it required the collaborative efforts of a dedicated team of volunteers and skilled craftsmen. Among them were Thomas Hitolaris, a young Albanian worker whose tireless efforts in digging, collecting, and transporting the necessary materials were essential to the project's success. Joining Thomas Hitolaris were Peter Hatherley and Doug Luik, two Australian veterans whose military experience and technical expertise were invaluable in the construction of the pillars and the overall design of the Avenue of Honour. And, of course, there was Panagiotis "Spitha's" Rassias, a longtime friend and collaborator of Adamis, whose tireless efforts in the various construction phases were crucial to the memorial's success. The Avenue of Honour is a testament to the power of community, to the ability of people from diverse backgrounds to come together in the service of a greater cause. It is a living, breathing embodiment of the ANZAC spirit, a reminder that even in the darkest of times, the human spirit can triumph through unity, courage, and a steadfast commitment to the values that define us as a people.



APPENDIX 3: ANCIENT AND MODERN SYMBOLISM

The Dedication and Inspiration. It is appropriate that the HANZAC Memorial is finally finished on October 28, 2022, after a five-year project. This date holds special significance, as it marks the day the valiant Greeks stopped the invaders from entering their homeland, becoming the first Allies to defeat an Axis power.

Inspiration. The HANZAC Memorial was officially opened in 2017 by Maria Vamvakinou, the Member for the electorate of Calwell in the Australian House of Representatives. Since then, numerous supporters, both military and non-military, have had their time and donations acknowledged on the memorial's marble. The inspiration for the memorial came from the Royal Australian Regiment Memorial in Brisbane, Queensland, Australia, the work of Lt Col Bastiaan (Retired), an Australian who placed plaques around the world where Australians fought and died and my tribute to the many who I had met in life..



Ancient Palace. The memorial is located directly opposite the Palace of Helen of Troy and her husband, Menelaus (Master of the War Cry), separated by approximately 500 metres. In days of old, this separation would have been by a vast expanse of water fed by the waterfalls that once fed the mighty Eurotas River. Sadly, over the centuries, that expanse of water has dried up due to earthquakes and modern irrigation methods that have lowered the water tables.

Local lore suggests that there was a tunnel leading down to the waterfall from the ramparts of the Palace, similar to the underground well at Mycenae. It is worth noting the similarities between Mycenae and Pellana, as both were ruled by brothers who had married sisters. Agamemnon at Mycenae and his brother Menelaus at Pellana, the latter of whom sought Agamemnon's support to bring back his abducted wife, Helen, from Troy – a venture that the ancients said launched a thousand ships.

Visitors to the village of Pellana can still view remnants of these waterfalls, with one cave waterfall hidden by a cement brick wall next to the village bakery and another located between the home of Stavros Mihalopoulos and the Tavern run by Dina Sigalos. These waterfalls once ran into a large pool providing drinking water for the locals and their livestock. The ancient ruins that once stood on this site were unceremoniously removed and deposited in the non-perennial stream called Xerilla, located 500 metres south of the village.

Ancient heritage. The memorial in the ancient past it is believed housed an ancient structure which may be buried deep with the bowels of the earth. Ancient Mycenaean road way was found and the foundations of an ancient Mycenaean building were discovered by my grandfather Phillip when he was ploughing the field. Over time the Mycenaean building vanished leaving the foundations.

When my grandfather returned from service during the Balkan wars, he began to plough and sow the field for agricultural reasons. In doing so, he uncovered an ancient Mycenaean and/or Hellenistic cemetery. In doing so, he gathered all of the skeletal bones that his plough uncovered and took them to the current and deposited them into the ossuary, which is located beneath the cemetery church. The flat grave stones he gathered them together and created a huge threshing field next to the stable where my brother Phillip and I were born.

Grandfather passed the field onto his eldest son Arthur, who passed it onto his daughter Eleni. Eleni and her husband removed the majority of the threshing field and dumped near the Xerila stream. And planted olive trees. In 2013, I purchased that land from my cousin Eleni, mainly because of the olive tree that was in existence when I was born. During the preparations for the memorial, additional flat grave stones were found where grandfather Phillip had his threshing field. These were washed, cleaned, photographed and then reburied around the Olive tree which was over 100 years old and a symbol of ancient guardians.

The foundations. The foundations for the memorial began in 2013 where tons of earth was brought in with the help of Dimitri Malliarou, who placed the soil on top of the current memorial, raising the land half a metre in height. The idea for raising the level was to ensure that the earth beneath was not disturbed for archaeological reasons.

Pellana ANZAC Wall. At the road level, there is a long wall with plaques depicting the HANZAC Memorial, the Northern villages, Directions, the village of Pellana, dedications and a welcome to North Laconia. This was built in 2024 by Nick Psarakis, Thomas Hitolaris, George Rassias, and is under construction for completion in 2026

Lacedaemon Symbol. Carved at the front of the Memorial is a huge Greek letter "L" (Lambada). It is the first letter of the Greek word for Lacedaemon (Lakonian). The symbol is powered by solar lights at night as a reminder of ancient Lacedaemon's existence. This was built by Thomas Hitolaris and Stavros Mihalopoulos.

HANZAC Steps. The Avenue of Honour. Leading up to the memorial are steps to assist visitors in reaching the top. A ramp will be installed in the future to accommodate those challenged by the steps. These steps were initially laid by Victorio Merici and completed by Kostas Sgourdas and Thomas Hitolaris. The fencing and welding surrounding the memorial was carried out by Panagiotis "Spitha Rassias.

Australian Eucalyptus Trees. Near the top of the steps, four Australian eucalyptus trees stand, each named after a mate: Doug Luik (representing "Other ranks"), Barrie Daniels (representing all Reserve personnel), Bruce Ruxton (representing past and present veterans), and Peter Hatherley (representing all Officers). The memorial is open to the public free of charge, a tribute to the memories of companions from three nations: Hellas (Greece), Australia, and New Zealand.

Fig Trees. In front there is a flagpole with the Greek flag, and on either side are two Australian fig trees, one representing my father (Vasili) and the other my mother (Kaliopi). The fruit from both these trees are extremely delicious and highly sought after.

The Lions of Pellana. It is appropriate that the lions of Pellana, standing aloft on the two front pillars of the HANZAC Memorial, stand guard. There are fourteen columns, each one representing one of the fourteen northern villages of Laconia. The idea for the columns came from Kostas Sgourdas, the Master Mason. The columns representing the villages are as follows: Pellana, Pardali, Georgitsi, Alevrou, Agorgianni, Loganikos, Agios Kostantinos (Regozena), Kastorio (Kastania), Perivolia, Vordonia, Kastri, Vergadeika, Foundeika, and Kyparrisi. Thomas Hitolaris (guest worker) laid the foundations of the columns and completed by Peter Hatherley and Doug Luik to provide the spectacular look. It is only fitting that, like their lion brothers at the gates of Mycenae, the HANZAC Memorial stands guard.

Olive Trees. Beside the columns are olive trees and bushes lining the Avenue of Honour. These olive trees represent my Uncle Thanasis, Cousin Eleni Stephanopoulos (who sold the property to me), Aunt Andonia, Tony Hammett, "Warrie" George Mansford, Kostas Sgourdas, Peter (Spitha) Rassias, Nephew William Adamis, Yiannis Kouros, Kostas Mihalopoulos, Families,

The Avenue of Honour sand. The sand beneath the columns represents the beaches of Gallipoli, where the ANZACS stormed the heights.

The Five Rings of the Memorial. The HANZAC Memorial is divided into five rings, each one symbolic of mankind's brotherhood and of Olympic symbolism.

The First Ring: The Panagia Chapel The first ring contains the Panagia Chapel, indicating mankind's link with the unknown God. This chapel was built and donated by Kostas Sgourdas.

The Second Ring: The Diaspora Stele The second ring contains a marble stele with a map of the world, depicting the travels of the Hellenic diaspora, including the surnames of the village clan.

The Third Ring: The Olive Tree and Poppy Seeds The third ring contains an olive tree. (My father would leave me hanging on the bough of the tree as a toddler to instil in me the message, "Never give up in the face of adversity.") Poppy seeds have been planted so that every ANZAC Day, the red poppies will appear, along with other perennially planted flowers. This ring symbolizes Family and the Earth, one of the three signs of life.

1. **Ashes and DNA.** The ring also contains my DNA from a thumb injury, including the ashes of my mates, Donald Norman, Mabs Thrupp, and Peter Bateman are scattered over the memorial, a tribute to a friendship spanning fifty years.

The Fourth Ring: The Hellenes, ANZACS, and Tributes The fourth ring is the one housing the Hellenes and ANZACS, the meaning of ANZAC Day, Mateship, Sacrifices by the three nations during WWII, the Battles of Greece and Crete, the futility of War, a tribute to Assyrians who died fighting in Greece, a tribute to all those who assisted me in life, a list of my mates' names, and images of a Hellenic, Australian (an Aussie soldier who served in Somalia - deceased), and a New Zealand warrior. The ring was built with the support of Dimitri Malliarou, Takis Moutis, Kostas Sgourdas, Maurice Barwick, Gerald Merici, Victorio Merici, Vasili Panagiotou, Thomas Hitolaris, Stefanos Sgourdas, Yiannis and Spiro Tsonis, Stavros Mihalopoulos, Joe Zapp, Bill Charlton, Gabby Kiwarkis and numerous supporters and donors outlined in Appendix 9.

Stone wall and flags. Within this ring stands a stone structure containing a marble slab with the words "Hellenic ANZAC Gardens" inscribed in both English and Greek. There are also three flags flying on a permanent basis: the Hellenic (host nation) on the left, the Australian in the centre, and the New Zealand on the right. This structure, along with the inner rings, is painted in red to symbolize the bloodshed in the fight for freedom. The memorial has significant links to an ancient past, a time when warriors of old clashed to retain their freedom from tyranny.

1. **The Arms.** This ring also contains a special mention to Maurice Barwick, Don Norman (deceased), and Barrie Daniel, and the author, depicting the original four members who began this memorial in 2017. It also contains two outer rings painted in red that embrace the urn located in the centre, which contains fire (lit on special occasions).
2. **The Urn.** The urn sits on a hollow pedestal that contains material from Thermopylae Greece), Gallipoli (Turkey), Uluru (Australia), Papua New Guinea, New Zealand, Pellana (Greece), and the ashes of Mabs Thrupp (ex-Army and friend) and DNA of my father. Fire is the second symbol of life.

The Fifth Ring: The Ode, Water, and the Twelve Trees The fifth and last ring contains inner rings that hold fast the stone with the Ode carved on marble in Greek and English. The Ode is surrounded by a pool of water containing goldfish. Stones and roses are found on the inner ring around the pool, followed by twelve trees that will grow to great heights, giving the appearance of a cathedral. This last ring represents Water, the symbol for life, along with its other two sisters, Earth and Fire. The pool is surrounded by twelve dwarf Cyprus trees which symbolises the twelve apostles. This trees were as a suggestion of Cousin Chris Glekas, a former policeman now retired. The ring was built with the support of Dimitri Malliarou, Aristotle Karagiannis, Takis Moutis, Kostas Sgourdas, Maurice Barwick, Gerald Merici, Victorio Merici, Vasili Panagiotou, Thomas Hitolaris, Stefanos Sgourdas, Peter Hatherley, Chris Glekas and Stavros Mihalopoulos.

The Lacedaemon ANZAC Wall. The circular wall, some two metres in height, depicts an ancient Mycenaean Laconian warrior accompanied by ANZACS from Gallipoli on the left and right. There are also two shields with the emblem (Lambda) upside down, which in Greek is the letter 'L' meaning Laconian. The wall is founded upon twelve huge rocks that have been buried deep to hold the structure upright. The wall has also been reinforced by metal bands at the rear and top to withstand minor tremors deep beneath the earth. This wall was donated by my mate, Don Norman (deceased), and his friend, Mavis Tregoning (deceased), both from Mt Gambier, South Australia. This was started by Vasili Panagiotou (completed by Victorio Merici (Guest workers), Stefanos Sgourdas, Stavros Mihalopoulos, Yiannis and Spiro Tsonis.

The ANZAC Long Wall The Long Wall of the memorial contains all the names of the ANZACS who died fighting for the citizens of Greece during the Battle of Greece and Crete. There are 1,706 names etched on the plaques, glued to marble on the wall. There are also three plaques that contain the history of ancient Pellana, the meaning of the wall, and those who donated towards making the wall possible. The HANZAC Memorial is one of a kind in the world, containing all the ANZACS who gave their all during WWII. Their spirits dwell amongst their Hellenic brethren, and the name alone speaks for itself.

The names of the WWII ANZACS were provided by Steve Kyritsis and Peter Ford. The ANZAC plaques are a generous donation from Dr. George Vasilopoulos and his wife and daughter (in memory of their son and brother, Theodore), Nick Bantounas, Maurice Barwick, Don Norman, John Kostoulas, Onoufrios Newy Gorozidis and many others whose names are etched on the marble stele outlined in Appendix 9. The wall was built by Victorio Merici, Stefanos, Sgourdas, Yiannis and Spiro Tsonis, Panagiotis "Spitha" Rassias and George Rassias.

The Guardian's Wall. The Guardian's Wall has etched on a metal plaque all the Guardian names of the HANZAC Memorial. The Greek Patron is Thanasis Davakis, a Lakonian Member of Parliament, the Australian Patron is Jim Hammett, a Colonel and the son of my favourite Commanding Officer, Tony Hammett, and we are still searching for an inspiring New Zealand Patron. The Guardian's wall was funded by Don Norman and Mavis Tregonning, built by Panagiotis "Spitha", Victorio Merici and completed by Stefanos Sgourdas, Yiannis and as, Spiro Tsonis and George Rassias.

The Plaque and Inscriptions. The guardians wall has the following inscription: "O Stranger, fear not the unknown, for this is hallowed ground. HANZAC companions forever at peace. Do not forget their struggles & sacrifices for they gave their lives for Hellas to remain free." [Peter Adamis - Royal Australian Regiment]. In addition other inscriptions read "The Greeks always made it obvious that we were their people and treated us one of their own." [Henry Jo Gullett - Australian Army Officer - Battle of Greece & Crete WWII & Ambassador to Greece] "Remember that to be happy means to be free and that to be free means to be brave. Therefore, do not take lightly the perils of war." [Thucydides - Ancient Greek General & Historian]

Hellenic wall. Nearby, the Hellenic Wall stands as a powerful tribute to the rich history and enduring legacy of the Hellenic people. Adorned with intricate carvings and stunning imagery, this monument traces the evolution of the Hellenic race, from the ancient warriors of Sparta to the modern-day citizens who have carried on the fight for freedom and democracy. The Hellenic Wall is a celebration of our shared history, a testament to the resilience and adaptability that have defined the Hellenic spirit for millennia. It is a physical embodiment of the deep roots that have nourished our people, a reminder of the sacrifices that have been made to secure the very freedoms that we enjoy today. The Hellenic Wall was built by Kostas Sgourdas and Thomas Hitolaris and completed by Stefanos Sgourdas, Yiannis and Spiro Tsonis and George Rassias. Funded by numerous supporters and donors outlined in Appendix 9.

As visitors run their fingers over the carved figures and imagery that adorn the Hellenic Wall, they are transported to a bygone era, a time when the echoes of battle still reverberated through the hills and valleys of Greece. They can almost hear the clash of steel, the roar of the crowd, and the cries of the fallen as they bear witness to the enduring legacy of the Hellenic warrior. But the Hellenic Wall is more than just a tribute to the past; it is a testament to the enduring spirit of the Hellenic people, a reminder that even in the face of the greatest adversity, the human spirit can triumph through resilience, courage, and a steadfast commitment to the values that define us as a people. When one looks at the Hellenic Wall, they see the faces of ancestors, the men and women who have fought and sacrificed to secure the very freedoms that we enjoy today. It is a humbling and inspiring experience, a reminder of the power of unity and the enduring bonds that have defined the Hellenic spirit for generations."

Inspiration wall. The Inspiration Wall, is a wall that serves as a physical embodiment of the driving force behind the HANZAC Memorial. Etched into its surface are the names of countless individuals. Officially opened in January 2024 by Yiannis Kouros, the legendary marathon runner, this wall, is dedicated those who have inspired millions around the world as well as paying tribute to community members, supporters and military members who have rallied behind the cause. The Inspiration Wall is a testament to the power of community and the enduring bonds of friendship that have sustained this project and who have recognized the profound significance of the HANZAC Memorial and have dedicated themselves to its preservation and development. But the Inspiration Wall is more than just a list of names; it is a physical manifestation of the enduring spirit that has guided the HANZAC Memorial from its inception. Each name represents a unique story, a personal connection to the history and heritage that this memorial seeks to preserve. The wall was funded by numerous supporters and donors outlined in Appendix 9.

Memorial pathways. The trail of pathways around the memorial depict the Kokoda Track of Papua New Guinea as a symbol to the 39th Battalion (Brunswick Citizen soldiers), as well as Thermopylae (Greece), where, like their 300 Spartan companions, the Australians and New Zealanders delayed and stemmed the tide of invaders. These pathways were built by Gerasimos Merici, Vasilios Merici, Vasili Panagiotou, Kostas Sgourdas, Thomas Hitolaris.

Family area. As for the family area, there will come a day when funds have been saved to install ablution blocks, permanent seating, and BBQ facilities. This year's special thanks and acknowledgements go to the following people who donated their time and funds to complete the memorial to its current state. It is for visitors to sit, relax, and take photos of the magnificent scenery of the memorial and its surroundings. The mighty Taygetos mountain range to the southwest, where the sun sets on the Ode, the Village of Pellana, and the ancient Palace to the north, the Parnona mountain range and Kouremenos (Baldy) to the east, where the sun rises onto the Ode, and to the south, where the lights of (ancient and) modern Sparta can be seen at night.

This section contains four flag poles, three at the rear and one behind the Laconian wall. In the centre is a Plane (Platanos) tree that is now three metres tall. This tree is dedicated to my friends Thelma and Maurice Barwick, who were instrumental in assisting me during a time of great personal turmoil. This tree will one day reach great heights and live in excess of 100 years. This tree was found, relocated and planted by Kostas Mihalopoulos. Kostas prunes the tree as it develops each year. The circular wall surrounding the Plane tree was built by Vasili Panagiotou (guest worker)

Security cameras. The security cameras were donated by Christine Ethel, funded by Nicholas Bantounas, Dr George Vassilopoulos and installed by the author with the assistance of Vasili Security, Theodore and Kostas Vlahakis and funded by numerous supporters and donors outlined in Appendix 9.

Solar Lights. The solar lights were installed by Theodore and Kostas Vlahakis, funded by numerous supporters and donors outlined in Appendix 9.

A Lasting Legacy of Unity and Sacrifice. As visitors move through the captivating and poignant displays of the HANZAC Memorial in Pellana, Laconia, Greece, they are struck by a profound sense of connection – a deep understanding of the shared history and enduring legacy that has brought the nations of Australia, New Zealand, and Greece together in the creation of this remarkable tribute. The HANZAC Memorial stands as a testament to the indomitable spirit of the ANZAC and Hellenic forces that fought side-by-side during the battles of World War II. Beyond the solemn memorials and tributes that dot its landscape, the memorial is a tapestry of symbolism, each element woven together to create a profound and lasting legacy.

From the towering eucalyptus trees that honour the diverse experiences of the Australian military to the majestic olive trees that symbolize the resilience of the Hellenic people, the HANZAC Memorial is a living, breathing embodiment of the unbreakable bonds that have united these three nations for generations. The sacred urn that holds the eternal flame, the tranquil pond that represents the cycle of life, and the Hellenic Wall that pays tribute to the ancient warriors of the region – all of these elements come together to create a profound and lasting tribute to the fallen.

But the HANZAC Memorial is more than just a collection of monuments and memorials; it is a testament to the power of community and the enduring bonds of friendship. The names etched into the walls and plaques, the contributions of local villagers and supporters, and the collaborative effort that has defined this project – all of these elements serve as a reminder that the HANZAC Memorial is not just a tribute to the past, but a celebration of the living who have dedicated themselves to preserving the memory of those who gave their all in the defense of freedom.

APPENDIX 4: THE GUARDIANS WALL

APPENDIX 5: THE ODE WITHIN THE POND

As one approaches the HANZAC Memorial in Pellana, Laconia, Greece, the first thing that captures the eye is the towering central rock structure, standing tall and proud as the centrepiece of this hallowed ground. This imposing monolith serves as the foundation upon which the entire memorial is built, symbolizing the enduring strength and permanence of the tribute. Carefully selected and transported to the site, the installation of this rock was no easy feat. It required the skilled hands and ancient techniques of local stonemason Kostas Sgourdas, who worked tirelessly alongside his team (Dimitri Malliarou, Gerald Merici, Victor Merici, Maurice Barwick and Peter Adamis) to secure the massive boulder in its prominent position. The rock provided by Aristotele Karagiannis and its very presence evokes a sense of solidity and steadfastness, mirroring the unwavering spirit of the soldiers it commemorates.

Surrounding the central rock is a tranquil pond, its still waters gently lapping at the edges. This serene body of water represents the "water" element, one of the three symbols of life alongside earth and fire. The pond's calming presence is accentuated by the vibrant goldfish that swim within, creating a mesmerizing display of life and movement. Flowers, stones, and roses line the perimeter of the pond, adding to the contemplative atmosphere. The delicate blooms and smooth pebbles serve as a gentle reminder of the fragility of life, while the resilient rose bushes symbolize the enduring spirit of those who gave their all in defence of freedom.

At the heart of this memorial, however, lies the Ode – a poetic tribute that has become inextricably linked with the solemn remembrance of fallen soldiers. Inscribed on two marble plaques, one in Greek and the other in English, the Ode is a central feature of the ceremonies held at the HANZAC Memorial. "Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them." The words, penned by the English poet Laurence Binyon, speak to the timeless nature of sacrifice and the enduring legacy of those who perished in the service of their nations. "They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old," the Ode begins, invoking a sense of reverence and eternal youth for the fallen.

As the Ode is recited, the weight of its message reverberates through the air, echoing the sorrow and gratitude that permeates the memorial. For it is through these hallowed words that the memory of the ANZAC and Hellenic soldiers who fought and died in the battles of Greece and Crete during World War II is kept alive. The Ode, the rock, and the memorial pond – each element a symbol of a deeper meaning, a tangible representation of the sacrifices made and the legacy that endures. APPENDIX 6: THE ANZAC WALL

A Solemn Tribute to Fallen Soldiers. At the eastern edge of the HANZAC Memorial in Pellana, Laconia, Greece, a solemn structure stands as a testament to the ultimate sacrifice made by soldiers during the battles of Greece and Crete in World War II. This is the ANZAC Wall, a marble monument that bears the names of 1,706 ANZAC soldiers who gave their lives in defence of freedom. The ANZAC Wall is a powerful symbol of the enduring bond between Australia, New Zealand, and Greece, forged in the crucible of war. It is a testament to the generosity and dedication of those who have supported the HANZAC Memorial project, with the wall itself donated by the late Don Norman, a veteran of the Australian Army, and his friend Mavis Tregoning, both from the town of Mt. Gambier in South Australia.

The task of inscribing the names onto the wall was a labour of love, undertaken by a team of volunteers led by Steve Kyritsis and Peter Ford. Kyritsis, an author who has chronicled the stories of Australians of Hellenic descent who served in the Vietnam War, and Ford, a veteran himself, worked tirelessly to ensure that each name was carefully and reverently etched into the marble. "We scoured through countless records, both in Australia and Greece, to ensure that we honoured every single soldier who fell during those fateful battles," explains Peter Adamis, the driving force behind the HANZAC Memorial. "It was a labour of love, but one that was essential to the integrity of the memorial."

As visitors approach the ANZAC Wall, they are struck by the sheer scale and gravity of the monument. The names, etched in neat rows, serve as a stark reminder of the immense cost of war and the sacrifices made by these young men in the defence of their nations. Alongside the names, three plaques provide historical context and acknowledgments. The first plaque outlines the significance of the wall and the meaning behind its construction, while the second and third plaques recognize the donors who made the wall possible and the initial individuals such as Dr George Vassilopoulos and Nicholas Bantounas who first made contributions to commence the HANZAC Memorial project.

Among the other donors acknowledged are Maurice Barwick, a retired Australian Army officer who has been a steadfast supporter of the HANZAC Memorial from the beginning, and Bill Papastergiadis, the President of the Greek Orthodox Community of Melbourne and Victoria, whose guidance and expertise have been invaluable. The construction of the ANZAC Wall was no small feat, and it required the collaborative efforts of Victorio (Dimitri) Merici, the Albanian guest worker built the ANZAC Wall from scratch with the support of Peter Adamis. The marble and plaques were installed by Yiannis and his brother Spiro Tsonis with the advice and support of Stefanos Sgourdas and George Rassias. The wall took shape, each name painstakingly etched into the marble, ensuring that the sacrifices of these men would never be forgotten.

APPENDIX 7: THE HELLENIC WALL

A Lasting Tribute to Shared Sacrifice. At the heart of the HANZAC Memorial in Pellana, Laconia, Greece, stands the Hellenic Wall – a solemn and powerful tribute to the soldiers of Australia, New Zealand, and Greece who fought and fell during the battles of World War II. This remarkable structure, with its rows of etched names, is a testament to the enduring bonds between these three nations, forged in the crucible of war. The Hellenic Wall was made possible through the generosity and dedication of a small, but determined group of individuals, each of whom played a vital role in its creation. At the center of this effort was Peter Adamis, the driving force behind the entire HANZAC Memorial project.

One of the key figure's instrumental in the construction of the Hellenic Wall was Kostas Sgourdas, a local stonemason whose skills and dedication were essential to the project's success. Sgourdas, a native of Pellana, had long been involved in the HANZAC Memorial, using his expertise to carefully craft and install the central rock feature that serves as the foundation of the memorial. When it came time to build the Hellenic Wall, Kostas Sgourdas once again stepped up, lending his guidance and expertise to the team of volunteers. Working alongside Adamis and his colleagues, Sgourdas meticulously planned the layout and construction of the wall, ensuring that each element was positioned with the utmost care and attention to detail.

"Kostas was an integral part of the Hellenic Wall's construction," Adamis says. "His knowledge of local materials and his skill as a stonemason were invaluable in bringing this project to life. Without his dedication and hard work, the wall would not be the powerful tribute that it is today." Sgourdas' involvement in the HANZAC Memorial extended beyond the Hellenic Wall, as he also played a crucial role in the creation of other key elements of the site. The central rock feature, for example, was carefully selected and transported to the location under Sgourdas' guidance, with the stonemason using ancient techniques to secure the massive boulder in its prominent position. Alongside Sgourdas, Thomas Hitolaris (Albanian Guest worker) and a team of volunteers led by Stefanos Sgourdas, Yiannis and his brother Spiro Tsonis with the support of and George Rassias.

The artwork and design of these plaques were the result of a collaborative effort between Adamis, Sgourdas, and a skilled local artist. Together, they worked to create a visually striking and historically accurate representation of the memorial's purpose and significance. The second and third plaques, in particular, are a testament to the generosity and dedication of those who have supported the HANZAC Memorial project. Among the donors acknowledged are Mavis Tregonning, Savvas Grigoropoulos, Maurice Barwick, a retired Australian Army officer who has been a steadfast supporter of the memorial from the beginning, and Bill Papastergiadis, the President of the Greek Orthodox Community of Melbourne and Victoria, George Vassilopoulos, and Nicholas Bantounas along with numerous other donors whose name are honoured in Appendix 11 whose guidance and expertise have been invaluable.

The construction of the Hellenic Wall was no small feat, as much research went into creating a chronology of Hellenic history and as such it has become a powerful symbol of enduring friendship between Australia, New Zealand, and Greece. A rod of iron joins both walls together and the iron rod may be found embedded within both walls. Visitors to the HANZAC Memorial are invited to walk the length of the wall, running their fingers over the names of the fallen, and reflecting on the immense cost of war. The Hellenic Wall is not just a memorial to those who struggled, fought and endured periods of oppression, but also a testament to the resilience and determination of the human spirit. It stands as a reminder that even in the darkest of times, the bonds of friendship and the pursuit of freedom can transcend the boundaries of nations and cultures.

As the sun rises and sets over the Taygetos Mountains, casting its warm glow upon the HANZAC Memorial, the Hellenic Wall becomes a reminder that throughout the ages, mankind has come to cherish freedom above all else. APPENDIX 8: THE INSPIRATION WALL

A Tribute to the Enduring Spirit of the ANZACS. Within the hallowed grounds of the HANZAC Memorial in Pellana, Laconia, Greece, stands a remarkable structure known as the Inspiration Wall. This initial wall was built by Vasili Panagiotou (Albanian Guest worker, enhanced by Victorio Merici and completed by Kostas Sgourdas (Master Stone mason and his aide Thomas Hitolaris. The plaques were installed with the support of Stefanos Sgourdas and completed by Yiannis and spiro Tsounis with the engraving by George Rassias. Funds were provided by Donald Norman, Mavis Tregonning, Dr George Vassilopoulos, Savvas Grigoropoulos, Bill Papastergiadis and many others whose names are found at Appendix 11.

Yiannis Kouros the legendary marathon runner who has inspired millions around the world officially opened the Inspiration wall. His presence alone added to the solemnity and importance of the occasion. "Yiannis Kouros embodies the very essence of the "inspiration" ethos," Adamis explains. "His ability to push the limits of human endurance, to overcome seemingly insurmountable challenges, is a testament to the indomitable spirit that defined the Hellenes and ANZAC forces". It was only fitting that he should be the one to officially open the Inspiration Wall and his image running will remain an inspiration to all who visit. On the day of the opening, in spite of the cold and wet weather conditions, true to form, Yiannis Kouros pulled the cord that revealed the Inspiration Wall to the gathered crowd, a hush fell over the assembly. In that moment, the past and present converged, as it was a profound and deeply moving experience, a reminder of the enduring power of the human spirit and the bonds that can transcend the boundaries of time and space. Yiannis during the ceremony planted an olive tree in memory of the fallen and he hoped that one day, visitors will truly understand the meaning of the Inspirational wall.

As the ceremony concluded, Kouros and the crowd moved into the cottage which lay opposite the memorial and addressed the gathered crowd, his words echoing with the same determination and passion that had carried him to countless victories on the world's toughest ultra-marathon courses. The crowd understood well that the Inspiration Wall is not just a memorial, but a testament to the indomitable spirit of men and women that continue to inspire us, to challenge us, and to remind us of the power of unity in the face of adversity.

The Inspiration wall has a plaque with 100 names from across the world who have inspired mankind, other plaques describe notable Hellenic and ANZAC men and women who have served their respective nations. In the days and weeks that followed, the Inspiration Wall became a focal point for the HANZAC Memorial, drawing visitors from around the world who came to pay their respects and to bear witness to the enduring legacy of the ANZAC forces. Adamis and his team of dedicated volunteers worked tirelessly to ensure that the site remained a place of reverence and reflection, a sanctuary where the spirits of the fallen could be honoured and their sacrifices never forgotten.

As the sun rises and sets over the Taygetos Mountains, casting its warm glow upon the HANZAC Memorial, the Inspiration Wall stands as a beacon of remembrance, a solemn reminder of the sacrifices made to secure the very freedoms that we enjoy today. It is a place where the past and present converge, where the bonds forged in the crucible of war continue to shape the understanding and respect between these three nations. The Inspiration Wall, with its towering figures and powerful artworks, is a testament to the enduring spirit of the ANZAC forces. APPENDIX12: BATTLE FOR GREECE AND CRETE WW2



The Battle of Greece and Crete in 1941 stands as a testament to the intense and multifaceted nature of World War II, showcasing the bravery, strategic errors, and high stakes that characterized the conflict. As spring arrived in 1941, the Axis powers, notably Germany, set their sights on Greece and the strategically crucial island of Crete. This campaign followed the repelling of the Italian invasion by Greek forces in October 1940, prompting Germany to intervene to secure its southern flank in preparation for its planned invasion of the Soviet Union.

On April 6, 1941, German forces launched an invasion of Greece, swiftly overpowering the combined Allied defenders from Britain, Australia, New Zealand, and Greece. The German onslaught forced the Allies into a fighting retreat southward. By the end of April, over 50,000 Allied troops had been evacuated from the Greek mainland to Crete, under the leadership of New Zealand's General Bernard Freyberg. There, they prepared for a German assault, poised to defend the island's strategic value.

The Battle of Crete commenced on May 20, 1941, with German paratroopers making a dramatic descent over the island's northern coast. Despite suffering heavy casualties during the initial airborne assault, the Germans managed to secure a precarious foothold around Maleme airfield. Over the following days, they consolidated their positions, taking advantage of a critical mistake on May 21, when New Zealand troops withdrew from the airfield, allowing the Germans to occupy this vital area. This decision, made by Lieutenant-Colonel Leslie Andrew of the 22nd New Zealand Battalion, marked a turning point in the battle, enabling the Germans to fly in additional troops and supplies.

As German forces advanced eastward, the Allied troops were forced into a gruelling retreat toward Crete's southern coast. The evacuation was hastily organized, with the Royal Navy managing to extract approximately 16,500 troops over several nights. However, thousands, including over 2,100 New Zealanders, were left behind. On June 1, 1941, the remaining Allied troops, known as Creforce, formally surrendered to the Germans. The Battle of Crete, though a victory for the Axis, came at a staggering cost. German casualties were high, with over 3,000 killed and many more wounded. The elite German paratroopers, the Fallschirmjäger, suffered such losses that Hitler refrained from using them in large-scale airborne operations thereafter.

The strategic implications of the battle were significant. Control over Crete allowed the Germans to dominate the eastern Mediterranean, projecting both air and naval power in the region. The Allies, though defeated, demonstrated remarkable courage and resilience. The New Zealand troops, in particular, played a central role, showcasing tenacity and valour despite overwhelming odds. Their actions earned them respect from both allies and adversaries and symbolized the indomitable spirit of the Allied forces.

The battle's aftermath had far-reaching effects. While the Axis powers extended their influence, the heavy losses incurred foreshadowed the challenges they would face in the subsequent years. The legacy of the Battle of Greece and Crete endures, commemorated through numerous memorials and events across the region, reflecting the bravery and sacrifice of those who fought. The bonds forged between the Cretan people and Allied soldiers have persisted, with the islanders maintaining deep respect and affection for their former defenders. This chapter in history continues to be a powerful reminder of the complexities of war and the enduring spirit of those who stood against Axis aggression.

Their resistance became legendary, embodying the spirit of defiance against tyranny. The New Zealand forces, under the command of General Bernard Freyberg, were particularly noted for their valour. Despite being outnumbered and outgunned, they engaged in fierce combat, especially at the pivotal Maleme airfield. Lieutenant-Colonel Leslie Andrew's controversial decision to withdraw from Maleme, while criticized, was part of the complex challenges faced by commanders in rapidly changing battle conditions. Despite their eventual defeat, the actions of the New Zealand troops were lauded for their gallantry, becoming a symbol of the unyielding spirit of the ANZAC forces.

Strategically, the Battle of Crete had profound implications. The Germans, despite capturing the island, paid a high price. Moreover, the delay in launching Operation Barbarossa to invade the Soviet Union, attributed in part to the campaigns in Greece and Crete, allowed the Soviets additional time to prepare their defences, contributing to the eventual failure of the German offensive.

The loss of Crete allowed the Axis powers to exert greater control over the eastern Mediterranean, threatening British naval supremacy and complicating supply routes crucial for the North African campaign.

It is commemorated each year in Greece, New Zealand, and other Allied countries, honouring those who fought and fell. APPENDIX 13: ONE MANS JOURNEY



The Conception and Inspiration (2015-2016). In 2015, as I lay in a hospital bed in Melbourne, Australia, battling a deadly form of blood cancer, my mind drifted between the harsh realities of my medical treatment and the cherished memories of my past. As a man of Greek heritage who had served in the Australian Defence Force for nearly three decades, I found myself drawn to the shared history and sacrifices of Australia, New Zealand, and Greece during World War II. The ANZAC legacy, forged in the crucible of battles like Gallipoli and the Greek campaign, had long held a special place in my heart. It was during those quiet moments of reflection that the seeds of inspiration for the Hellenic ANZAC Gardens project were first sown. With the unwavering support of my wife, Yovanna, I made a solemn promise that if I survived the cancer treatment, I would return to my birthplace of Pellana, Greece and construct a memorial to honour the ANZAC spirit and the enduring bonds between the three countries.

As I recuperated, I poured my heart and soul into refining my vision for the memorial. I envisioned a place that would capture the shared history and sacrifices of the three nations, a sanctuary where the ANZAC legacy could be honoured and preserved for generations to come. The location I had chosen, the small village of Pellana in the Laconia region of Greece, held particular significance, as it was here that Australian and New Zealand soldiers had fought and died alongside their Greek counterparts, forging an unbreakable bond in the crucible of war.

Laying the Foundations (2017). In 2017, with my health in reasonable shape, I embarked on the first step of my ambitious undertaking – traveling to Pellana, Greece to begin the initial construction of the Hellenic ANZAC Gardens. One of the challenges I faced was fending off attempts by local thieves and vagabonds to target the property. Undeterred, I reinforced the home and transformed it into a veritable fortress, refusing to let these setbacks deter me. Amidst the construction work, I observed a simple ANZAC Day ceremony, paying tribute to my fallen comrades and feeling a profound sense of connection to the men and women who had given their lives in service of their countries.

The Official Opening (2017) In 2017, The Hellenic ANZAC Gardens project reached a pivotal moment, as we prepared for the official opening ceremony. The event was graced by the presence of Australian MP Maria Vamvakinou, a steadfast supporter of the project. The ceremony was a poignant and celebratory occasion, with the local villagers who had lent their time and labour to the construction standing alongside, their faces alight with a sense of shared accomplishment.

Expanding the Vision (2019-2022). As the Hellenic ANZAC Gardens entered the next phase of its development, we remained focused on expanding and refining the memorial, determined to create a comprehensive tribute that would truly capture the shared history and sacrifices of Australia, New Zealand, and Greece. One of our primary goals was to bring the site to life through the creation of detailed dioramas and interpretive displays, transporting visitors back in time and allowing them to viscerally connect with the pivotal moments that had forged the ANZAC legacy.
